STANDBRED HORSE SHOW AUGUST 6 AT NJ HORSE PARK

The 44th annual standardbred horse show sponsored by the SBOA of New Jersey is scheduled for Sunday, August 6, at the Horse Park of New Jersey in Upper Freehold Township, near Allentown.

This year's show will begin at 11 a.m., rain or shine. Admission and refreshments are free. The 147-acre Horse Park is located on Route 524, a few miles from Exit 11 of Interstate 195.

Once again, there will be the traditional standardbred yearling show with separate classes for colts and Geldings and for fillies, along with two classes of mare and foal judging, one with younger foals born on or after April 15, and with older foals born on or before April 14.

There will also be a lottery-type drawing for free 2007 New Jersey stallion breedings donated by stallion owners and breeding farms, Revenue S and Red River Hanover from Perretti Farms, and Nikki Cole Cole from Two Gaits Farm.

NJ HORSE INDUSTRY UNIFIED TO WORK FOR MORE FUNDS

A new statewide coalition of horse organizations is in the process of being formed to devote a major effort to convince state officials to pursue efforts that will expand revenue sources for the horse racing and overall equine industry in New Jersey.

The coalition will be known as the New Jersey Horse Industry Alliance (NJHIA). The founding members will be the official standardbred and thoroughbred racing and breeding groups and the Equine Science Center at Rutgers University. Other equine groups are expected to participate.

The first major event being planned is a symposium for state legislators on September 20 at Monmouth Park racetrack. Panel discussions are tentatively scheduled to cover such topics as the economic impact of racing and the equine industry on the state's agriculture, commerce and tourism, and how to participate in the process of seeking revenue from such sources as purse supplements, slot machines or video lottery terminals at the racetracks.

Details of the September 20 event will be announced soon.

Other door prizes donated by industry vendors include two tons of Buckeye Feed from Reynolds Hay & Straw and one ton of feed each from New Egypt Agway and Global Ag Associates (Agway of Hightstown, Flemington, Clinton and Washington).

A total of \$7,500 in prize money provided by the State Department of Agriculture through the N. J. Equine Advisory Board, will be awarded to the owners of the first four finishers in each division of the two yearling and two mare and foal classes, as follows: \$600, first place; \$400, second place; \$300, third place, and \$200, fourth place. Another \$1,500 will go to the grand champion in the yearling class.

All entry forms, entry fees, registration certificates, Coggins test results and release forms must be submitted to the SBOANJ no later than July 21, 2006.

SHORE HALL OF FAME INDUCTS D'ALTRUI

The Jersey Shore Sports Hall of Fame has inducted long-time standardbred breeder and owner Thomas N. D'Altrui, an officer and director of the SBOA of New Jersey for more than 33 years, at ceremonies June 21 at FirstEnergy Park, home of the Lakewood Blue Claws minor league baseball team. As one of this year's 10 honorees, D'Altrui joins such previous harness racing inductees as Stanley Dancer, Catello Manzi and Harold Kelly, among others.

HANDLE INCREASE AT FREEHOLD

The Freehold Raceway meet that ended May 27 produced increases in live handle, 3.5 percent from \$26.8 million to \$27.8 million, and live transmission handle, 2.9 percent from \$114.9 million to \$118.4 million. A new trotting stakes race was added to the Freehold schedule during this meet to honor the late Frank Rubinetti, a long-time standardbred owner.

FREEHOLD FALL HARNESS MEET FEATURES NJSS COMPETITION

The lucrative New Jersey Sire Stakes pari-mutuel program and Green Acres series will highlight the racing calendar when Freehold Raceway re-opens for its fall-winter meet on August 10.

Slated for the opening day program will be the first round of Sire Stakes Green Acres competition for two-year-old pacing colts and geldings and three-year-old pacing fillies. The Sire Stakes Pari-Mutuel Division begins August 12 with competition for two-year-old pacing fillies and two-year-old pacing colts and geldings.

Other upcoming stakes program highlights include the \$90,000 Helen Smith Trot Final on August 18, \$125,000 Molly Pitcher on August 19, \$350,000 Cane Pace, \$175,000 Shady Daisy Pace and \$150,000 Battle Of Freehold on September 4, \$90,000 Harold R. Dancer Trot Final on September 14, \$80,000 Dancer Filly Trot Final on September 19, Charles I. Smith Trot Final on October 13 and the \$300,000 James B. Dancer Memorial, \$150,000 Lou Babic Open and \$70,000 Babic Filly Pace Finals on October 14.

EQUINE CAREER EVENT TO FEATURE INGRASSIA AND DR. HOGAN

High school-aged students considering a career with horses are invited to meet two women with successful careers working with horses on July 6 at White Birch Farm in Allentown.

Trainer/driver Jacqueline Ingrassia and equine surgeon Dr. Patricia Hogan will describe the ins and outs of their jobs, career paths and how young people can prepare for a career working with horses. The day will begin at 11 a.m. at White Birch, where Mrs. Ingrassia's horses are stabled and proceed to nearby Clarksburg, where Dr. Hogan practices at the New Jersey Equine Clinic. The event will conclude at about 2:30.

Mrs. Ingrassia has more than 1,000 wins as a driver and is the only woman to win a Trotting Triple Crown race. Dr. Hogan has treated many high profile racehorses from both the Standardbred and Thoroughbred world, including 2004 Kentucky Derby winner Smarty Jones.

NJSEA TRACKS WAGER \$1.2 MILLION ON BELMONT

The combined Meadowlands and Monmouth Park handle on the Belmont Stakes June 10 surpassed \$1.2 million, with another \$221,488 handled through New Jersey Account Wagering, \$198,601 via Internet and \$22,887 by phone. A Meadowlands crowd of 7,450 turned out to watch and wager nearly \$750,000.

President's Message

For the past month or so, you couldn't read the newspapers, watch local television or listen to local radio stations without hearing about the financial crisis facing the State of New Jersey.

The Governor and the State Legislature have been arguing about how to close the gap between expenses and revenue in the state budget—a one percent increase in the state sales tax, cutbacks in spending and other pet ideas of our state officials. Down to the wire again for the state budget.

Well, the horse racing industry in New Jersey isn't going to wait until the last minute for its financial crisis.

The \$86-million, 4-year supplement from the Atlantic City casino industry to horse racing purses ends in 2007, the last year we will get the funds. As every one knows, this money was provided so that the casino industry did not have to deal with the possibility of slot machines at our racetracks, particularly The Meadowlands.

Meanwhile, our neighboring states, Pennsylvania and New York, are about to launch slots and VLTs at their racetracks, which will provide a huge boost to purses there. When that happens, we will have hit the wall, so to speak, and our financial crisis will be upon us.

There will be evidence that the competition from our neighboring states will severely hurt, if not destroy, New Jersey racing.

Until now, the casino industry has opposed slot machines at The Meadowlands on the grounds that it would hurt the casinos' bottom line. Why The Meadowlands is a threat and not the slot machines that are going to be in two Pennsylvania tracks just across the river from New Jersey (and closer to Atlantic City than The Meadowlands, by the way), is hard to understand.

Another fact that the supporters of the casino industry in New Jersey don't like to discuss is that the casino industry is already partnering with

racetracks in other parts of the country. There already are Harrah's at Louisiana Downs and Mohegan Sun at Pocono Downs. And in September, there will be another harness track in Pennsylvania, Harrah's at Chester Downs.

And in other states which have slots at the racetracks, the track names have been changed to reflect the casino atmosphere with such identifications as "Racino" or simply "Casino & Racetrack."

It has been pretty clear that the State of New Jersey is not ready to consider slot machines at our racetracks at the present time, probably because of the huge economic strength of the casino industry. But that doesn't mean there is no hope for our racing industry.

While slots may not be a realistic opportunity at the moment, the casino supplement could be extended for at least a few more years and increased to meet the competition from slots in Pennsylvania and VLTs in New York.

So, the standardbred horse industry in New Jersey, represented by the Standardbred Breeders and Owners Association, is joining with the thoroughbred horse industry, represented by the N. J. Thoroughbred Horsemen's Association, and the N. J. Thoroughbred Breeders Association, and the Equine Science Center at Rutgers University.

The goal is to develop a plan to convince state officials to act now to find a source of revenue that will allow New Jersey horse racing and breeding to keep up with the competition from other states.

The entire horse industry in New Jersey has unified under the banner of the New Jersey Horse Industry Alliance (NJHIA), as you will note in an article on page one of this issue of *Pacesetter*. It is very significant that the two racing breeds are working closely together to find ways to increase purses and financially help a slowly declining racing and breeding industry.

Together with the fine work of the Equine Science Center headed by Dr. Karyn Malinowski, one of the most respected people in the equine industry, we hope that the State of New Jersey will finally recognize the need to respond to the pleas of the horse industry.

Everyone involved in racing and breeding horses should participate in this effort. There is strength in numbers.

We are also going to need financial help from the people within our industry, to conduct a legislative lobbying effort to convince members of the State Legislature to support measures and programs to stabilize and help increase our racing industry's stature.

Please contribute now to the Standardbred Horse Industry Political Action Committee (SHIPAC) at 28 West State Street, Suite 702, Trenton, NJ 08608, so that we can continue the campaign for more purse money. Every dollar counts.

While the current Meadowlands meet is coming to a close, with some of the most prestigious stakes in our sport on the program, we cannot lose sight of the need to continue to support our industry.

Don't forget that Freehold Raceway will re-open for live racing on August 10, only five days after the Meadowlands meet ends. And, of course, the Meadowlands late fall meet opens in November.

Renovations and construction on the new Meadowlands paddock will begin as soon as the current meet closes. As I noted in the last issue of *Pacesetter*, we have been waiting for years for this project.

The new 13-race paddock will alleviate a great deal of the problems that have cramped racing there. The work is supposed to be completed by the summer of 2007. Wouldn't it be great to know then that we have a more solid purse structure as a result of our unified horse industry efforts.

For the second year in a row, one stallion sired the winners of New Jersey's two biggest state-bred races. For 2006, the winners were sired by Artiscap, Feelin Friskie in the \$500,000 Anthony Abbatiello New Jersey Pacing Classic, and Future Destiny in the \$175,000 Thomas D'Altrui Miss New Jersey Pace. Last year's winners, Rocknroll Hanover and Ideal News, were both offspring of the stallion Western Ideal. Feelin Friskie, driven by Hall of Fame driver John Campbell, won the Classic in a stakes record 1:49.1 for owner Wayne Whebby and trainer Scott Bell. They were greeted in the winner's circle by Abbatiello and officers and directors of the SBOA of New Jersey, founders and sponsors of the richest homebred race in the nation. Future Destiny, driven by George Brennan for trainer George Teague Jr., was welcomed into the winner's circle by Miss New Jersey Julie Robenhymmer, D'Altrui, SBOANJ representatives and her owners after a 1:50.3 victory. The filly is co-owned by Teague, his sister Brenda, K & R Racing (Kevin and Ronald Fry), retired New York Jets receiver Wayner Chrebet's Double Down Stables and former heavyweight boxing champion George Foreman. CONDOLENCES & SYMPATHY TO FAMILY & FRIENDS OF . . .



Ralph J. Pocaro, of Summit, owner of more than 75 standardbreds for the past 40 years, including Guts, winner of \$1.6 million, and a member of the SBOANJ Board of Directors for more than 35 years, died May 28 at Beth Israel Medical Center in Newark at the age of 80. He suffered from arterial lateral sclerosis (ALS), commonly referred to as Lou Gehrig's disease for the New York Yankee Hall of Fame baseball player who died from it; also a prominent New Jersey attorney who often represented people involved in harness racing; survived by his wife Toni, daughters Kris Halpern and Cindy Jenkins, sons Jeffrey and Steven, and nine grandchildren.

Hal Belote, 51, of Williamstown, prominent harness driver who died from injuries in a racing accident at Harrington Raceway on May 15; winner of 1,986 races with purse earnings of more than \$10.7 million in a 30-year racing career; also a veteran standardbred trainer; brother of trainer-driver John (Sammy) Belote III; predeceased in 2005 by his father, veteran horseman John Belote Jr. and mother; also survived by his wife Sharon, a son, Hal Jr., and daughter, Dara, and a sister.

Caroline D. Manzi, mother of Monticello Raceway publicist John Manzi, who died May 30 at the Catskill Regional Medical Center at the age of 86; also the aunt of Hall of Fame harness driver Catello "Cat" Manzi and driver-trainers Steve Manzi and Ed Lohmeyer; a practical nurse for 30 years, she worked in the operating rooms of the old Monticello Hospital and later Community General Hospital, which is now Catskill Regional; also survived by sons Gerard and Gary, eight grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

Gary J. Burroughs, son of 1997 Hambletonian winner Mal Burroughs, who died last month in Morristown at the age of 44.
